Recommended Four-Year Plan for Honors

First Year

- Take two required Honors core courses; one in the fall and the other in the spring
 - 1) HON 201H- Perennial Questions (satisfies Foundations F4a)
 - 2) HON 203H- Institutions, Society & the Self (satisfies Foundations F4c)
 - 3) HON 205H Scientific Approach to Contemporary Challenges (satisfies Foundations F4d)
- You should also consider any appropriate Honors Foundations or major course. These courses will count as Honors electives. Examples of courses that sometimes have Honors sections include: RHW 102, COM 203, ECO 150, HIS 120, GOV 207, and BIO 111.
- You should also consider HON 250 courses cross-listed with various major courses. (Often count toward Foundations.)

Second Year

Attempt to take at least 2 Honors courses.

- Take an Honors core course if you have not already taken two. Even if you have taken two Honors core courses, you could take a third as an Honors elective course.
- Look for an Honors section of a Foundations or major course.
- Look for Honors 250 courses cross-listed with courses in your major.
- Honors at Glasgow (either semester for Foundations)

Third Year

- If you have not completed two Honors core courses and three Honors electives, complete the remaining courses this year. If you are having trouble finding Honors courses that fit your schedule, consider Honorizing a course in your major.
- Take HON 300 Honors Transitions in the Fall.
- Take HON 450 Senior Thesis I in the spring
- Honors at Glasgow (either semester for upper-level or Foundations)

Fourth Year

• Take HON 451 - Senior Thesis II in the fall and defend your thesis.

Honors at Glasgow

The Honors Program has a special Honors at Glasgow Study Abroad program. Students will take one Honors elective course, Scottish Enlightenment, in addition to other courses. (This course may also satisfy a requirement in the Foundations curriculum.) Students should plan to study at

Glasgow during the sophomore or junior year to be able to meet other honors requirements. See "Honors at Glasgow".

This four-year plan is a recommendation and is not mandatory; it is merely a suggested path to help you fulfill your Honors requirements. Other plans are possible. Discuss alternatives with the Honors Director(s) and/or your advisor.
